The event takes place annually in conjunction with the March of Dimes WalkAmerica and Car Show, which Building and Safety also hosted. Mardi Gras was the theme.

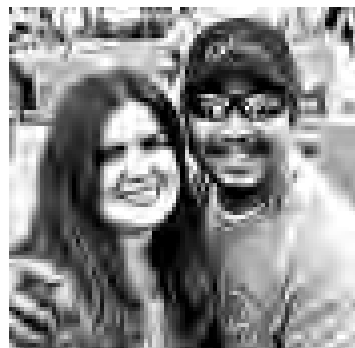

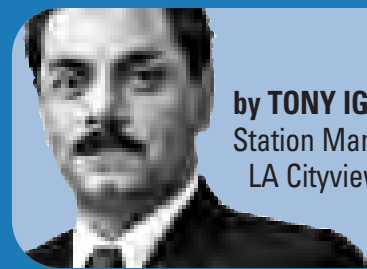

## Watch Channel 35 Online, on Demand!

Soon, everyone will be able to watch Channel 35's programming on demand on their computer, thanks to a joint project between City Clerk and the Information Technology Agency. Recently, the City Council approved a pilot project that will enable Channel 35 to provide up to 250 hours of programming on demand, just a click away. Equally as exciting is the ability to search past City Council agendas online and be able to view the relevant discussion within seconds. We're very excited about the prospect of on-demand programming online because it affords others besides cable television viewers to access valuable community information. Currently, all Channel 35 programming is available online through live streaming. But with the on-demand feature you can set your own schedule to tune in, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

#### CityWorks
