

It was another exciting award year for LA Cityview 35. At its 58th annual LA-area Emmy Awards, the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences handed out the Emmys to local broadcasters and cable programmers Aug. 12. LA Cityview 35 was nominated with four Emmys, which included staff members for best non-news director, best non-news editor, best public services announcement and best program in the category of public, municipal and cable-produced. LA Cityview 35 walked away with two Emmys: best non-news director, and best public service announcement campaign. The campaign was produced in partnership with Transportation to promote safe driving habits and conditions. And, for the second consecutive year, our very own talented Robert Manciero also was honored for the best non-news director.

This brings the station's total Emmy count to 11, which not only makes us extremely proud of our programming, but also proves that, when in the company of big-budget broadcast stations, LA Cityview 35 outshines many formidable competitors.

"We invite homeowners and anyone interested in planting trees or helping sustain the Los Angeles Urban Forest to visit the Website," said Board of Public Works Commissioner Paula Daniels, who also serves as Initiative Chair for the Mayor's Million Tree Program. "This is especially significant in light of the goal set by Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa's One Million Tree Initiative to plant one million trees in the next several years."

"We are pleased to be able to provide this additional resource for City residents and businesses," said Bureau of Street Services Director William A. Robertson. "This new website is our way of encouraging everyone in the City to become involved and support Mayor Villaraigosa's Million Tree Initiative."

Urban Forestry is a division of Public Work's Bureau of Street Services. Urban Forestry is responsible for the creation, development and enforcement of street tree policies, standards and guidelines for one of the largest urban forests in the nation. It is also responsible for maintaining more than 680,000 street trees in Los Angeles and more than 1,000 different species growing along the 6,500 miles of public rights-of-way within the City.
