## Ontario's Holiday Heroes

## ■ LA Ontario Airport Rescue and Fire Fighting (ARFF) Safety Officers are holiday heroes to 170 children.

AIRPORTS — LA/Ontario International Airport (ONT) hosted more than 170 children from the Ontario Homework Enrichment Reading and Outreach (Hero) Club, and the Upland Partnership for Youth Development at a Dec. 14 holiday party that included a traditional holiday dinner, entertainment, gifts and a visit from Santa Claus, who arrived by helicopter. The Hero Club and the Upland Partnership for Youth Development are nonprofit organizations that provide after-school services for children. LA Ontario's Holiday Heroes program began in 2002 when Airport Rescue and Fire Fighting (ARFF) Safety Officers David Duncan and Bill Nugent led the effort to "adopt" children from areas surrounding the airport.

"RBI Toys in Ontario and Toys R Us in Fontana gave us a huge donation, and Mattel Toys in Pomona gave us a huge discount," Duncan added. "The rest of the toys were donated by airport employees. The airport and surrounding business communities really get involved."

The Sounds of Seasons, a group that sings holiday carols, sang for the children while they
