



FIREWORKS ARE ILLEGAL;

Leave It To

I want you and your family to be safe on the Fourth of July and all holidays. The best ways to do that is by attending approved fireworks shows and know all your local laws.

Here are some things to remember:

- The use or sale of all fireworks have been illegal in the City of Los Angels since 1942, except at approved shows.
- The Fourth of July is one of the busiest days of the year for emergency services.
- People using illegal fireworks cause most emergency calls for fires and injuries.
- Most firecracker injuries happen to the eyes, hands, head and face.
- The highest numbers of injuries are from firecrackers (26 percent), rockets (21 percent) and sparklers (11 percent).
- Almost half of all people injured were children under the age of 15.
- More bystanders are injured by fireworks displays than by the people who set them off.
- Sparklers can heat up to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit (hot enough to melt gold).
- Possessing fireworks is a misdemeanor, punishable with a fine of \$1,000 and/or jail.

fireworks safety rules

Here are some fireworks safety rules.

- If you see a fire, call 911.
- Do not use fireworks.

■ Never let anyone touch or pick up a dud firecracker that is lying on the ground. (Contact the proper authority.)

■ Animals have very sensitive hearing and can be stressed or frightened due to noise from fireworks. So: Keep your pets indoors with the windows closed and the air conditioner on, and turn on the volume of the television or radio to help block some of the noise.

The goal of the LAFD Anti-Fireworks campaign is to reduce the number of fire and injuries from fireworks; remind citizen that all fireworks are illegal in the City of Los Angeles; and encourage all citizens to attend a public fireworks dis-

Play it safe and stay away from fireworks.
