Officer Massey began with the City in December 1973, working for the Los Angeles Police Department as a Radio Telephone Operator (RTO). She promoted to a Trainer Operator in 1978.

That year she received the "Police Star" medal for her heroic civic duty of challenging a six-foot, 380-pound male suspect attempting to rob and assault a University of Southern California co-ed student in the Los Angeles Sports Arena's parking lot, while Massey was jogging with her young daughter.

In 1980, Massey begin her career with Airports as a Special Officer. As a cadet in Class 03 at the Rio Hondo Police Academy in Whittier, she completed two months of academy training. After graduating she was assigned to Boarding Services at the LAX terminal gates and later assigned to the Traffic Unit.

Massey worked various assignments and had many experiences during her employment with the Airport Police. The last four years of service, Massey was assigned to the Planning and Development Section, where she worked in the Training Unit. For many years she was a board member on the Association of Airport Employees (AAE) Committee.

"My plans while retired are to enjoy my family, work in my garden, travel, concentrate on my physical well being and participant in more of my church's auxiliaries," she said.


