Banning Heritage Days

Residence Museum offers its annual heritage days June 7.

The Banning Residence Museum presents Banning Heritage Day and a Summer Exhibition Opening. Banning Heritage Day and the Summer Exhibition celebrating the Sesquicentennial of Wilmington will take place Sat., June 7, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Banning Museum, 401 East M St. in Wilmington.

The schedule of events will include a lecture at 10 a.m. entitled, "Wheels of Progress: Phineas Banning's Staging and Freighting Empire," presented by Banning Museum Director Michael Sanborn. The lecture is \$5 for members and \$10 for non-members. Reservations are required for the lecture and reservations can be requested by calling the Museum at (310) 548-7777.

Beginning at 11 a.m., the event will also offer self-guided tours of the Museum, entertainment by Yesteryears dancers, an interactive G-scalemodel railway display, children's crafts and activities, and complimentary cake in celebration of the 150th anniversary of Wilmington. The Norris Museum Shop will offer gift items and seasonal décor, and food will be available for purchase. Also on this day, the Port of Los Angeles will provide free shuttle buses to harbor area museums and historic sites including: Drum Barracks Civil War Museum, Banning's Landing, Los Angeles Maritime Museum, Fort MacArthur Military Museum and Point Fermin Lighthouse.

The Summer Exhibition on display until September 2008 celebrates Wilmington's 150th anniversary. Founded in 1858 by Phineas Banning, Wilmington is one of the oldest towns in Los Angeles County. Learn about Wilmington's unique beginnings and the pioneers who combined vision and hard work to see their community grow and prosper. The rooms of the Banning Museum will be decked in patriotic splendor as the family prepares to celebrate July 4, 1908. View Edwardian summer fashions, patriotic arts and crafts, and period style decorations.

The photo gallery will continue to celebrate this landmark anniversary with a special exhibition, "Photographic Memory: Images of Wilmington's History." The exhibition of historic documents and photographs will include rare images of Wilmington, from the 1860s through the early decades of the 20th century.

The Banning Museum is a Rec and Parks facility and is operated in conjunction with the Friends of Banning Museum.
