## Airport Police Torch Run

On June 10, 10 Airport Police officers ran in the Southern California Law Enforcement Torch Run for the Special Olympics to promote and raise funds for the Special Olympics. This is Airport Police's ninth year of participation. The run began with a Torch Lighting ceremony at the Chula Vista Police Dept. Memorial Wall, then traveled through Paso Robles City Park in San Luis Obispo County, before entering Los Angeles County.

Airport Police Asst. Chief Michael Hyams, Sgt. Troy Takaki, and Officers Tanansuk Chow, James Adrian, Richard Blaha, Starla Reader, Jorge Mora, Mark Corral, Daniel Keehne and LAPD Officer Tom Davoren received the torch from representatives of the FBI at the intersection of Pershing Drive and Imperial Highway. They ran 3.5 miles where the torch was passed to Hawthorne Police Dept. participants at the intersection of La Cienega Boulevard and Imperial Highway. Support for the runners was provided by Airport Police Motor Officers James Bow and Miguel Morante and Officer Tomas Garcia

Chief George R. Centeno said, "I am very proud of the officers and supervisors who participated in this very worthwhile event. The Special Olympics is embraced by law enforcement as an expression of support for the athletes and their families that participate in the games."

Officers from local, county, state, federal and military agencies carry the "Flame of Hope" throughout Southern California and the three main legs (Central, North and South) merged at the Summer Games at Cal State Long Beach June11 and 12. There the three torches were "unified" into a single flame used to light the Opening Ceremony cauldron and symbolize the start of the 2011 Special Olympics Summer Games.

The Los Angeles Airport Police Supervisors Association and the Los Angeles Airport Police Officers Association made generous donations to the Special Olympics in support of the Torch Run. This year, law enforcement officers throughout Southern California raised \$900,000 for the Special Olympics, which will ensure the athletes receive the best sports training and competition possible.

In 2010, officers raised more than \$1.2 million for Special Olympics Southern California. The donations are directed into program support and development, expenses for athlete participation in local, regional, state and international competitions as well as training workshops and conferences.
