Public Works Week 2012

Annual event puts the spotlight on public works throughout our communities. Club sponsors award event.

Public Works once again participated in National Public Works Week May 20-26. The weeklong event showcases the good that the department does in keeping Los Angeles running.

National focus was on Public Works professionals and their contributions to sustainable solutions under the theme: "Public Works: Creating a Lasting Impression." In a

gala celebration ceremony, Board of Public Works Commissioners and Bureau Directors presented certificates of appreciation to 27 Public Works employees for their work on sustainable projects in the City and to express why LA's is the best Public Works Department in the nation.

The Public Works Task Force for Employee Achievement and Morale provided refreshments in a reception that followed, and the City Employees Club generously donated almost \$400 in gifts for honorees. Nearly

200 coworkers, family members and friends attended the event.

A reading of Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa's Public Works Week proclamation at Board of Public Works meeting kicked off the week. More than 4,715 Public Works staff received environmentally friendly Public Works Week e-certificates distributed electronically. Stormwater capture and solar light-emitting-diode project dedications; LEED-certified green building facility demonstrations, and recognitions of City investments to sustainable

infrastructure improvements and environmental stewardship, were among other events. Students and staff, 102 total, from local LAUSD schools visited the Environmental Learning Center at Hyperion Treatment Plant.

Council Offices also supported Public Works to make Public Works Week 2012 a memorable celebration that included stakeholders and residents, and reiterated the Department's commitment to sustainability in LA.
