



In Memory of Martín Chavez [1959 - 2012]

Martín Chavez was a leader with the **Port and a great supporter of the Club.**

The Club is mourning the loss of Martín Chavez, Human Resources Officer at the Port of Los Angeles, and Club Board Member, who joined the board several years ago and was instrumental in supporting the Club and contributing to Alive!

Martín suffered a massive cerebral hemorrhage Sept. 18 and passed away Sept. 21.

"Martín was one of the Club's greatest friends and allies at the Port of LA," said John Hawkins, Club CEO. "For years he championed on our behalf, giving us access and inviting us to special events.

"Martín's absence is going to be felt far and wide, especially on the Club Board, where he tirelessly helped direct the Club to its current destination," John continued. "We will keep his family in our prayers. We really miss him."

In an autobiography Martín wrote several years ago, he said that he enjoyed "making people happy; playing with my niece, Regi, and nephew, Matthew; buying a gift for my mother; surprising brothers and sisters with things; and sending stuff to people.'

Memorial services were held for Martín shortly after his death.

Biography

Martín Chavez was born in Los Angeles in 1959. He graduated from Cal State Dominguez Hills, receiving a Bachelor of science degree in public administration and a Bachelor of arts degree in political science in 1981 and a Master's degree in public administration in 1983.

He began his career in the City Personnel Department in August 1984, moving to the DWP in November 1984, and joining the Harbor Department as a Personnel Analyst in 1994. He was promoted to Sr. Personnel Analyst in 1987.

Martín was the personnel liaison analyst for Port Police, Wharfingers and Risk Management divisions and was the Worker's Compensation liaison working with the Risk Management Division, the City Personnel Department and the City Attorney's office tracking and managing work's compensation issues.

His real strength lay in mentoring the student workers who worked at the department in the past 15 years. During the 2000-01 academic year, Martín created a high school internship program with the Wilmington Banning High School International Trade Education program. The ITEP program places Banning High students in paid summer positions in the department and with local employers involved in international trade so they can develop the skills necessary to succeed in the workforce. Martín was also the Program Coordinator for the Harbor Department Perfect Attendance program, which recognized employees for their exemplary attendance. Martin acted as the Master of Ceremonies at the annual luncheon and enjoyed handing out the prizes to the winners. Martín served on the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles City Employees Association (City Employees Club). He was recognized as Employee Club Representative of the Year in 2011 for his work reporting on the accomplishments of Harbor Department employees.

Martín was a proud alumnus of Cal State Dominguez Hills. He was a four-time President of the Cal State Dominguez Hills Alumni Association and served on the Alumni Association Board of Directors for more than 15 years.

He received the prestigious Cesar Chavez Community Service Award from Cal State Dominguez Hills and was recognized by the California State Assembly for his work in the community to improve educational opportunities.

At the time of his death, Martín was President of the Southern California School Personnel Commissioners Association and was Chairperson of the Compton Unified School District Personnel Commission. He had been a member of the National Medical Enterprises Board of Governors, the Compton Latino Chamber of Commerce Executive Board, and served on the Los Angeles Unified School District Superintendent's Committee on the Education and Employment of the Disabled, and on the Minority Engineering Program Advisory Boards at USC, UCLA and UC Irvine.

Family Perspective

Regina Grant, Harbor/Port Police, niece of Martín Chavez, remembered her uncle in this essay written for Alive!:

"The biggest hobby my uncle enjoyed was every show or exhibit out there. He collected model cars (never built any) still new in boxes in his garage. He collected coins, buttons, pencils, cassettes, records, DVDs, VHS tapes, CDs, hats, baseball caps, football jerseys, and collectible toys, not to mention anything on a free sample table, including key chains, bumper stickers, pens, and T-shirts. If it were free he would go over to get what he could, then send my younger cousins or me over. This stuff would usually be for someone at the office or elsewhere that he knew would enjoy it.

"He enjoyed the theatre. We went

The ITEP/Port of Los Angeles Internship Program, produced in cooperation with the International Trade Education Programs (ITEP), meant a lot to Martín Chavez. To preserve his legacy, ITEP has announced that it is creating the Martín D. Chavez Scholarship Fund, to support the program, which fosters the career and college aspirations of the young people in the Harbor area.

The Martín D. Chavez Scholarship Fund will support career and educational aspirations for seniors and alumni who have participated in ITEP's programs. Martín was a key member of ITEP's Scholarship Committee and was adamant that the "whole" student be considered, not just their GPA. Thus, the scholarship will be awarded based on a broad view of the applicant's academic ability, potential, professional interest, character, dedication to the community and career commitment.
