# SHIPLEY NATURE CENTER

— Huntington Beach

**Hello everyone!**

This month we went to Huntington Beach and the Shipley Nature Center. This was my first time at the nature center; there was so much to see. However, it seems with the rain we just had, some of the trails were submerged and were closed. So, if you are planning on going, I recommend you call them especially after a rainfall.

There were many birds flying around and lots of plant life all around us. I think I will have to go back and see the entire park and trails in a few weeks. There is also an area for Frisbee throwing and a dog park just walking distance from Shipley Nature Center.

Let's begin.

**History**

Shipley Nature Center opened in 1974. It's an 18-acre fenced natural area named after former Mayor Donald D. Shipley.

After years of neglect, the Nature Center became overrun with invasive, exotic plant species that crowded out more desirable native plants on which local native wildlife depends. Non-native tamarisk and giant reeds depleted the ground water. Dead Monterey pines and giant reeds were a fire risk and needed to be removed. The Blackbird Pond suffered from lack of oxygen, especially during the summer months. With donations and grants and both paid and volunteer labor, the Friends of Shipley Nature Center and the City of Huntington Beach spearheaded a complete restoration. Included in the restoration were the removal of invasive, non-native plants, upgrading of the trail system, installation of a drip irrigation system to enhance water conservation, and the planting of 50,000 California native plants. Water-feature restoration included the creation of a freshwater stream to provide pond circulation and aeration. The stream will

provide a powerful lure for migrating and resident birds. Restoration will greatly enhance habitat value for wildlife and will provide improved opportunities for environmental education.

The center has more than 4,000 feet of well-maintained trails that walk you through several habitats, including oak woodlands, Torrey pines, meadows, and Blackbird Pond, a natural freshwater wetland with mature willows and sycamores. Within the Nature Center is a 1,500-square-foot interpretive building
