# Putting a Shine On Hollywood

# Street Services paves Hollywood Boulevard with a shiny new roadway treatment.

Red carpet movie premieres at Grauman's Chinese Theater will have a new luster now that Public Works/Street Services has resurfaced Hollywood Boulevard with a

unique roadway treatment known as "Glassphalt." This special asphalt blend includes 10 percent finely processed glass, producing the effect of subtle points of light emanating from the roadway.

Last November, Street Services' Resurfacing Division paved Hollywood Boulevard from La Brea Avenue to Gower Street on three consecutive evenings from 9 p.m. to 7 a.m. Daytime work was avoided to ensure that retail commerce along the busy boulevard continued without interruption.

Renewing 1.4 miles of road surface, the job required the removal of 396,900 square feet of old asphalt and the installation of 6,118 tons of new asphalt. Completing this much work in such a short time required three asphalt removal crews, two paving crews, and the combined output of both of the City's municipal asphalt plants.

# Air Bag Safety

Air bags save thousands of lives each year, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). In frontal crashes, air bags reduce deaths among drivers by about 30 percent and among passengers by 27 percent.

Air bags, however, can be dangerous. If small children sit unbelted in the front seat, they can be catapulted into the path of a deploying air bag, which inflates with great force. This risk also applies to small adults who must sit close to the steering wheel to reach the pedals, pregnant women and the elderly. Infants in rear-facing safety seats on the passenger side can be severely injured because their heads are in the direct path of an inflating air bag. If your airbag is stolen or it deploys, you must get a new one, but you will be reimbursed under the comprehensive portion of your auto insurance policy.

## **Preventing Air Bag Injuries**

Drivers should have all children sit in the backseat wearing a safety belt. Infants should be placed in rear-facing car seats and put in the backseat. Small adults should move the seat back so that their breastbone is at least 10 inches from the air bag cover.

If this is not possible, air bag switches can be installed so that the vehicle owner has the option of turning the bag off or on, depending on the situation.

## **Preventing Theft**

Insurance industry statistics show that approximately 50,000 air bags are stolen each year, resulting in an annual loss of more than \$50,000,000 to vehicle owners and their insurance companies.

Air bags have quickly become a primary accessory on the black market for stolen vehicle parts. A new air bag, which retails for approximately \$1,000 from a car dealer, costs between \$50 and \$200 on the black market. Because of their portability, air bags can be easily removed and installed as "new" by unscrupulous collision repair shops. These dishonest operators will then charge the vehicle owner or their insurer the full price for the replacement, thus committing insurance fraud.

## **Fraud and Theft Prevention Tips**

The National Insurance Crime Bureau suggests the following prevention tips to help avoid airbag fraud and theft.

- Use a reputable automobile collision repair shop that employs ASE-certified mechanics.
- Inspect the invoice to ensure the repair shop purchased the air bag from a manufacturer, dealer or recycler.
- If possible, inspect the air bag prior to installation. If new, it should be packaged in a sealed container from the manufacturer.
- The trim cover over the steering column should be the same color as the remaining trim interior. If not, it is an indication that the original air bag has been replaced.
- When you turn on your vehicle's ignition, a red SRS (Supplemental Restraint System) indicator should light up and flash in the instrument panel display, indicating the air bag system is activated. No SRS light means that the air bag is not new.
