or stamina, dedication and physical fitness, there's nothing like the annual Baker to Vegas Challenge Cup Relay, held in the desert April 13-14.

This amazing foot race is an annual event for public safety organizations throughout the world. The relay race is a 120-mile, 20-stage foot race between Baker, Calif., and Las Vegas and is considered the "Super Bowl" of law enforcement; the champions are the best, in terms of physical fitness and logistics the police world has to offer. The race was created by and is managed by the Los Angeles Police Rotary and Athletic Club, and the City Employees Club is grateful for their leadership.

This year was the Club's ninth covering this amazing event, going out on the racecourse through dusty winds, cold and 100-plus degree temperatures to deliver to Alive! readers what goes on during the 120-mile foot race.

This was an exceptional year for LAPD's Department Team as they celebrated a back-to-back victory, capturing the coveted title of first place overall at 13 hours 2 minutes and 32 seconds, with LA Sheriff's Dept. County Wide in second place at 13 hours 15 minutes and 52 seconds. LAPD Women also came in first place in the all-women team, finishing at 15 hour 50 minutes and 17 seconds. In total, 260 teams participated including the Hamburg Police from Germany, Queensland Police Service from Australia and a team from Calgary, Alberta, Canada. It was Calgary's 25th anniversary as partici-

By Saturday race day, the road conditions were 95 degrees at start of the first run – not as hot at last year, when 798 runners were treated for some type of dehydration.

New this year were bibs, which easily identified the team, and some bibs even had photos as a tribute to a fellow colleague.

Again this year, the Club sponsored five teams, and here are the results:

- Team 183 LAPD ESD/FSD, 19 hours, 11 minutes and 47 seconds.








