Rick Smith, one Jof the overseers of the LAPD Bomb Squad, I happened to be watching television, which I don't do a lot of... and saw a live shot of a car with an LAPD Officer standing behind it, a few long cables coming out of the car, and absolutely not another living person within blocks.
